General Meeting: May 8, 2018, at the North Lamar Senior Center

Mike Coley called the meeting to order at 10:08 A.M.

Programs: Mike introduced our speaker, John Hunewill, VP marketing for Celltex Therapeutics Corp. Stem cells exist in bone marrow and fat, but decrease as we age. Celltex specializes in harvesting Mesenchymal Stem Cells (MSC) from abdominal fat, culturing the cells in a lab to create a personal cell bank that is stored in liquid nitrogen (cryogenic storage). These cells are capable of producing an anti-inflammatory response, modulate the immune response, or develop into bone, cartilage, nerve or blood vessels. Some of the potential therapies are for neuropathy, rheumatoid arthritis, joint disease, peripheral artery disease, diabetes, Parkinson's and other nerve disorders.

To employ their services one must 1) enroll in the program; 2) then blood is screened for various communicable diseases 3) Dr. Jones, Chief Medical Officer in Houston, reviews the medical history, and if approved, 4) 10-20cc of abdominal fat is extracted and processed. When needed, a portion of the cell bank is cultured to create a "therapeutic dose" of 200 million stem cells. Administration of the stem cells currently has to be done in a private hospital at Cancun, Mexico, until approval by the FDA. The size of this dose is reported to be more effective than an in-office procedure by a physician, which involves fewer stem cells, but is not regulated by the FDA.

This therapy was evaluated by the Charles River Lab in Pennsylvania with mice at up to 44 times the normal human dose without toxicity, tumor growth, or other adverse effects. Since 2011, 4500 people have had treatments without rejections or adverse effects. While this is not necessarily a permanent cure, it has been shown to be an effective therapy. Since it is currently in development, as you might expect, it is expensive, but may be less than medications that only relieve symptoms.

A Tip to Save some Money By Jim Binneboese

If you are the owner of a traditional IRA (not a ROTH), you must generally start receiving distributions from your IRA by April 1 of the year following the year in which you reach age $70\frac{1}{2}$. April 1 of the year following the year in which you reach age $70\frac{1}{2}$ is referred to as "the required beginning date."

The IRA provider will provide a dollar sum to you as the owner stating how much will need to be held back or withdrawn. (This follows a chart and formula provided by the IRS). By the end of the appropriate tax year, this amount must be withdrawn from the IRA account. Each IRA you own will need to treated in the same way. Not doing this exercise each year may lead to a penalty of up to 50% excise tax on the amount not distributed as required. It is expensive to miss these dates after you reach the age of $70\frac{1}{2}$.

The money withdrawn can be used to re-invest or taken in cash. In both cases, the money that is taken out is taxable and will need to be reported on your Form 1040. If you decide to take more than the required minimum from your IRA, you will not be able to treat the excess as part of your required minimum distribution for any later year.

There are two exceptions to the "taxable" rule. **These two exceptions are (1) rollovers and (2) Qualified charitable distributions.** On the rollover exception, moving it to another qualified IRA will not be a taxable event. However, there is another choice that can be used to be an exception to taxes.

A qualified charitable distribution (QCD) is generally a nontaxable distribution made directly by the IRA owner to an organization eligible to receive tax deductible contributions (a certified 501c3 charity). You must be at least age $70\frac{1}{2}$ when the distribution is made. Also, you must have the same type of acknowledgment of your contribution that you would need to claim a deduction for a charitable contribution – in other words, a receipt from the charity. The maximum annual exclusion for QCD's is \$100,000. If you file a joint return, your spouse can also have a QCD and exclude up to \$100,000.

A QCD will count towards your required RMD's for the year but will not be included on your income line on the IRS 1040 form. Contact the IRA provider and give them a list of the charities you want to contribute to. The distribution will be made per your instructions and you will be sent a confirmation of the transaction.

With the new 2018 tax laws in effect, the per family deduction amount is raised to \$24,000. This will likely mean less stated individual deductions declared on Schedule A than in the past. Most will use the new standard deduction. The QCD exception may turn out to be a real cost-saving for most seniors because this amount is taken off the taxable income line.
